# Consultation on gTLD Delegation and Redelegation Performance Standards



## Consultation Objective

The Internet Assigned Numbers Authority (IANA) Functions contract (SA1301-12-CN-0035) between ICANN and the United States Department of Commerce, National Telecommunications Information Administration (NTIA) to maintain the continuity and stability of services related to certain interdependent Internet technical management functions, known collectively as the Internet Assigned Numbers Authority calls for a public consultation from all interested and affected parties to help satisfy the following objective:

*C.2.8 Performance Standards — Within six (6) months of award, the Contractor shall develop performance standards, in collaboration with all interested and affected parties as enumerated in Section C.1.3, for each of the IANA functions as set forth at C.2.9 to C.2.9.4 and post via a website.*

This consultation involves the Delegation and Redelelegation of Generic Top Level Domain (gTLD) requests described in the IANA Functions contract as the following:

*C.2.9.2.d Delegation and Redelelegation of a Generic Top Level Domain (gTLD) - The Contractor shall verify that all requests related to the delegation and re delegation of gTLDs are consistent with the procedures developed by ICANN. In making a delegation or re delegation recommendation, the Contractor must provide documentation verifying that ICANN followed its own policy framework including specific documentation demonstrating how the process provided the opportunity for input from relevant stakeholders and was supportive of the global public interest. The Contractor shall submit its recommendations to the COR via a Delegation and Redelelegation Report.*

## This Consultation

This consultation requests input from the community on what indicates good performance in processing requests for the delegation or re delegation of a gTLD. The consultation is about key performance indicators and not about gTLD policy development.

## Background

The process guiding eligibility for root zone delegations resulting from the New gTLD Program is defined in ICANN's New gTLD Applicant Guidebook (<http://newgtlds.icann.org/en/applicants/agb>).

Requestors for delegation of any gTLD must have completed an evaluation as a registry operator with ICANN prior to being eligible to lodge a Root Zone Change Request for delegation. In the "New gTLD Program," this means they must have successfully concluded the relevant evaluation process, and have executed a registry agreement with ICANN, before a root zone change can be considered.

For a request to redelegate an existing gTLD, ICANN's IANA Department processes requests that relate to the change of control provisions in the gTLD registry agreement with ICANN.

In performing the IANA functions as called for in Section C.2.9.2.d of the IANA Functions



contract, ICANN's IANA Department will verify that all gTLD delegation and redelegation requests are consistent with the approved and documented processes for making such requests.

In the performance of the IANA functions to date, ICANN has collected data that was provided in the monthly contractual report transmitted to NTIA. These reports made no differentiation between the processing of Country Code Top Level Domains (ccTLD) and gTLDs.

## Proposed performance indicators for gTLD Delegations and Redelegations

ICANN tracks the life cycle of each gTLD delegation and redelegation request in its ticket tracking system. This includes all communications exchanged with the requestor during the pendency of each request, and the status of the request at any given time. This data can be used to derive measurements such as the end-to-end processing time of a request, plus the amount of time a given request was within a specific processing state.

Some areas for performance indicators that ICANN has considered related to the gTLD delegation and redelegation function are listed below, and ICANN is offering these as potential areas for Key Performance Indicators (KPI) in order to encourage discussion.

Aspects of performance standards that ICANN has identified as candidates for discussion are:

In addition to the targets for measuring ICANN's own performance, ICANN is proposing to publish a full set of measurements for gTLD delegations and redelegations. This would include statistical averages for the performance for all parties involved in the process.

4. Do you have additional input on suitable performance standards for the gTLD delegation and redelegation service?
