4:00 pm - 5:00 pm		<p>Session 4: STATUS OF NIEMOpen & FBI CJIS PROGRAMS <i>Paul Wormeli, Innovation Strategist, Wormeli Consulting, LLC; Brian Griffith, Deputy Assistant Director, Identification and Investigative Services Branch, FBI Criminal Justice Information Services Division</i></p> <p><i>Important systems and services that state and local criminal justice agencies rely on are making progress. This session will highlight the advancements made in the transition of the National Information Exchange Model (NIEM) to NIEMOpen under the auspices of OASIS (where NAJIS is a sponsor) and the significant improvements and advancements in the crucial services that the FBI provides to criminal justice, including in particular the forward motion on NIBRS as major increases in participation have occurred and also in the restructuring of the NICS as the FBI has moved to make services more readily available throughout the country. Paul Wormeli, Co-chair of the NIEMOpen Communications and Outreach committee, and Brian Griffith from the FBI CJIS Division will present an up to date summary of the changes and advancements in these programs that will benefit criminal justice stakeholders.</i></p>

		<p>Session 6: Session Pending <i>Speaker Pending</i></p> <p><i>Insert Description</i></p>	<p>Session 7: CJC STANDARDS <i>Thomas Eberly; Katie Green; Holly Matthews; Mandy Potapenko</i></p> <p><i>The National Institute of Corrections (NIC) in partnership with the Justice Management Institute (JMI) has developed new national standards for criminal justice coordinating councils (CJCCs). CJCCs are established bodies of key criminal justice, government, and community stakeholders that convene regularly to identify systemic challenges and work collaboratively to improve the local criminal justice system. Recent research indicates that CJCCs greatly improve communication and collaboration in local criminal justice systems. The national standards were created to formalize best practices for CJCCs and to assist jurisdictions in forming and sustaining productive councils.</i></p>

We will also showcase innovative examples of how organizations are using technology, such as machine learning and artificial intelligence, to analyze data and identify patterns of trafficking activity. Additionally, we will discuss the importance of collaboration between law enforcement, the public, and the technology sector to develop effective solutions that protect vulnerable populations and hold traffickers accountable. These range from intelligence gathering during rapidly evolving public safety situations, package delivery to monitoring of industrial pollution. As this technology is quickly becoming cheaper and more powerful, and interest in deploying drones among law enforcement agencies and fire departments is increasing around the country, rules and policies must be put in place to ensure that we can enjoy the benefits of this new technology without violating our privacy or threatening our civil liberties. The pandemic forced courts to use existing technology in novel ways, accelerate the adoption of scheduled technology advances and look for new technology to use in the court system. For many courts, that effort had a particular focus on digital evidence management based on experiences during, and after, the pandemic, including Arizona's experience.
