<http://www.renowntours.com/default.htm> runs day-cruises out of Seward. We GREATLY recommend the National Parks (6-hour) cruise! Pat was at first hesitant because of her uncertainty about boats, but friends convinced her it was worthwhile and she loved it! (So did my daughter and I) The boats are large catamarans, so absent large storms, are very stable. You can drive to Seward (3 hours), or they have transportation packages by bus or Alaska Railroad. The bus is a lovely ride, but I'd like to take the RR this time.

<http://www.anchoragemuseum.org/> is a fine museum, and it's only two blocks from the hotel. It may take more than one visit to fully enjoy.

I didn't get there, but Pat and Elena both enjoyed it very much. There is a combined ticket with the Anchorage Museum that saves a few dollars.

Drive to see Portage Glacier up close. Near there is <http://www.awcc.org/web/home.html> the Alaska Wildlife Conservation Center. They are some distance out of town but Pat and Elena found them both very interesting.
